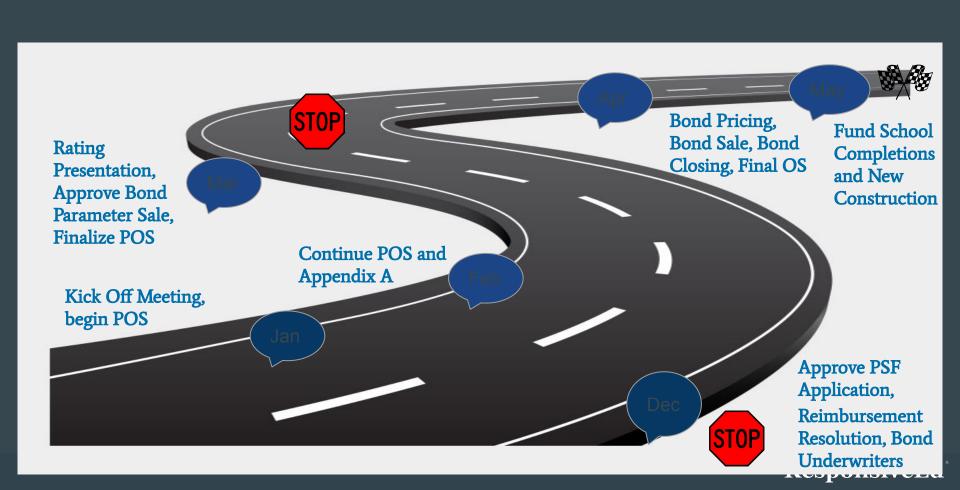

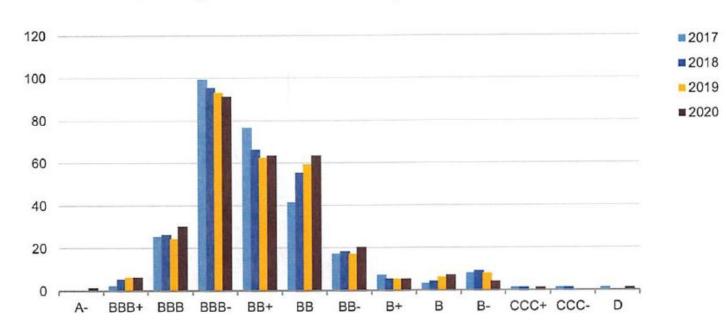

Students enrolling in 7th through 12th Grade are required to have one dose of and meningococcal (MCV4) vaccine on or after the student's 11th birthday. In accordance with state law and

regulations, additional vaccines may be required by DSHS and/or local health authorities in specific situations pursuant to a control order containing control measures.

Provisional Enrollment

A student can be enrolled provisionally for no more than 30 days from the first day of attendance only if:

- 1. he/she is transferring from a Texas school to a Texas school and is awaiting the transfer of the immunization record; or
- 2. is a dependent of a parent who is Active Duty Military with a valid ID card and is awaiting the transfer of the immunization record. or

A student who is homeless, as defined in the McKinney Vento Homeless Assistance Act or a student who is a child in foster care shall be enrolled temporarily for 30 days if acceptable evidence of vaccination is not available. The school shall promptly refer the student to an appropriate health provider to obtain the required vaccinations.

Students transferring from a Texas public school who were reclassified by a previous LPAC committee will be monitored but will not receive ESL services. All decisions about ESL services for students will be made by the LPAC Committee.

Parents have the right to accept or deny ESL Services. In the State of Texas, any student identified as an English Learner is required to take the state language assessments included in TELPAS. Students, whose parents deny ESL services, are required to take the TELPAS assessments.

The purpose of the ESL program is to address the affective, linguistic, and cognitive needs of English Learners. The ESL program shall enable English Learners to become competent in listening, speaking, reading, and writing in the English language through the integrated use of second language acquisition methods across the content area.

The school offers Bilingual Education and English as a Second Language (ESL) services to students who are English Language Learners (ELLs). Students with a Home Language Survey indicating a language other than English for either the student and/or home language are assessed with a state-approved assessment. The results of that assessment determine if a student qualifies for identification as an ELL and whether or not Bilingual/ ESL services are offered. The Language Proficiency Assessment Committee (LPAC) will determine the types of services the student needs, including accommodations or modifications related to classroom instruction, local assessments, and state-mandated assessments.

Parents have a right to accept or deny Bilingual/ESL services, but may not deny the ELL identification. The purpose of both the Bilingual and ESL program is to address the affective, linguistic, and eognitive needs of English Language Learners. The goal of bilingual education programs is to enable English Language Learners to become competent in listening, speaking, reading, and writing in the English language through the development of literacy and academic skills in the primary language and English.

The goal of ESL programs shall be to enable English Language Learners to become competent in listening, speaking, reading, and writing in the English language through the integrated use of second language acquisition methods. The ESL program shall emphasize the mastery of English language skills, as well as mathematics, science, and social studies, as integral parts of the academic goals for all students to enable English Language Learners to participate equitably in school.
